ensure our district remains the best it 03:05 can be and that we continue to provide 03:07 top-notch education for our students 03:09 that they deserve we face huge 03:11 challenges ahead and collaboration is 03:14 the key to success in my mind 03:16 i've always made decisions based on what 03:18 i thought was in the best interest of 03:19 all of the students in the district 03.21 keeping in mind there are many different 03:23 types of students in our district i 03:25 always thought about what would keep 03:26 them safe emotionally and physically 03:29 what would make our students reach their 03:30 highest potential and what would excite 03:32 and interest them one of the most 03:34 important initiatives that i supported 03:36 in champion was advancing our use of 03.38 technology and integrating it into our 03:40 classrooms in an efficient productive 03:42 and innovative manner 03:44 which quickly was enabled during covid 03:47 and i consider this experience with the 03:49 technology a silver lining of the 03:50 pandemic and i hope it continues to 03:53 expand don't get me wrong i believe in 03:55 person learning and teacher-student 03:57 face-to-face interactions are by far the 03:59 most important way to learn however 04:01 technology can expand on these learning 04:04 experiences greatly 04:06 i've also been involved in trying to 04:07 develop partnerships with universities 04:09 and businesses to expand our students 04:11 access to real-life opportunities as the 04:14 world is changing at a rapid speed i 04:16 truly hope morristown public schools can 04:18 expand upon the incredible foundation

04:22 and reputation it has to establish 04:24 relationships with local universities 04:26 businesses and organization 04:28 also our work on diversity inclusion has 04:30 been such an important part of these 04:32 past two years we have had some 04:34 important yet difficult conversations 04:36 but necessary ones 04:38 this is critical work that has been done 04:40 and must continue to make sure our 04:41 students feel comfortable and belong a 04:43 sense of belonging while i am sad to 04:46 leave the board i know you are in good 04:47 hands 04:49 please have some grace on our students . 04:51 our staff 04:52 these are truly some of the hardest 04:54 times they've had as much as last year's 04:56 remote learning was stressful in some 04:58 ways this year has proven even harder 05:00 for some as we continue to deal with the 05:03 impact on the pandemic and we have seen 05:05 that in our students 05:08 unfortunately 05:12 i appreciate the opportunity to work 05:14 with all of my board colleagues 05:16 it was a tough year but despite all of 05:18 the challenges i think now the district 05:21 is in a position to move forward 05:23 successfully 05:24 being a board member is mostly a 05:26 thankless job as we all know so i do 05:28 want to take the opportunity to thank 05:31 all of you 05:32 for the opportunity to me to serve as 05:34 board president but most importantly 05:37 each board member your true dedication 05:39

your time your effort and support of our 05:42 district during these extremely 05:43 challenging times 05:45 in addition to dealing with the impact 05:47 and ramifications that wreaked havoc on 05:50 all school districts 05:51 in the world 05:53 from a board perspective we had some 05:55 most significant board challenges as 05:56 well this year including interviewing 05:59 and appointing an interim superintendent 06:01 interviewing and appointing a permanent 06:03 superintendent and the mist appointing a 06:05 board member to fill a board vacancy 06:08 i just wanted to take the opportunity to 06:10 say all this to you and i want to give 06:13 wish the district and the new board of 06:15 education much success as we move into 06:17 the school year 06:19 so thank you all 06:22 [Applause] 06:27 thank you 06:29 we also have um 06:31 two other board members 06:33 that are and david weinstein and kathy 06:35 mullin will also be um 06:37 departing the board as well i don't know 06:39 if either of you 06:41 have anything that you'd like to say or 06:50 thank you uh cameron and uh i thank 06:53 you all uh my current 06:55 board fellow board members and all the 06:57 members of the public who have uh 07:00 found faith in me i was first elected in 07:02 2009 which seems like about several 07:05 decades ago now 07:06 um 07:07 and i was probably the last board member

07:09 elected uh through an april election 07:11 that's sitting at least i think in 07:12 burlington county still so 07:14 um it's been a while and uh i was 07:18 mentored by one of the most terrific 07:20 human beings a 07:22 board member here by larry named larry 07:24 friedman 07:26 and he taught me to always just do the 07:28 right thing 07:29 follow your heart 07:30 and treat others as you want to be 07:32 treated and 07:34 fight people with a pen and paper when 07:36 you have something to say 07:38 because it matters 07:40 um i came in to this board 07:42 during a crisis 07:44 horrible economic crisis 07:46 i'm leaving this board during a public 07:48 health crisis 07:49 and in between there were many crises 07:52 that occurred but one thing that always 07:54 was true is that the community 07:56 felt strongly about the schools 07:59 um and we've always done what we feel is 08:01 right as a community for our students 08:04 um i've negotiated contracts with our 80:80 existing mea leadership our existing maa 08:10 leadership and while we didn't always 08:13 agree about what needed to be in the 08:15 contracts we always agreed about the 08:17 purpose which was to make sure that the 08:19 district itself 08:20 did the right things for the students 08:22 fairly for both 08:24 our existing staff 08:26

and 08:27 the community and for that i thank you 08:29 for your time during your negotiations 08:35 i uh 08:37 when i came in we held taxes to zero for 08:39 several years 08:41 um but then we spent the money 08:43 over several years after because the 08:45 world freed up 08:47 and i want you to always think that what 08:49 we do today 08:50 we always do have a long goal and that's 08:52 to make sure the students are educated 08:54 to the best of our ability 08:56 by the generosity of you letting us do 08:59 it 09:00 um i've been in the minority i've been 09:03 the majority on many decisions 09:05 um always following the same principles 09:08 i fought 09:10 to avoid loss of programming for 09:12 students over the years 09:14 we've lost a lot of programming over the 09:15 years folks 09.17i didn't even want to take a list and i 09:19 stopped because 09:20 we can't afford to run the programs we 09:22 once ran and it's not because of 09:24 anything other than we're limited by the 09:26 state of new jersey and how much money 09:28 we're able to raise 09.29 you don't decide anymore you don't have 09:32 a voice in your local school district 09:34 anymore 09:35 the state took that away from you 09:37 and as long as we stay within a 09:38 budgetary cap 09:41 you never will have that voice again

09:42 except for by electing people up here 09:44 and for that i'm very sorry 09:47 um 09:48 i've worked on the board with a lot of 09:49 passionate people over the years 09:51 don't always agree but we always respect 09:53 each other over the years um there was a 09:56 lot of crisis on the board over the 09:57 years too 09:58 we had crisises of ethics 10:02 faith 10:04 we had superintendents leaving left and 10:06 right we had stability for a long time 10:09 but one thing that held true the entire 10:10 time is that the community still 10:11 believed in the education process that 10:14 we delivered and believed in our staff 10:16 and this board to continue to provide 10:17 that education 10:19 i had a lot of good memories of handing 10:21 out diplomas to students over the years 10:24 and every decision 10:25 was made with the exact same thought in 10:27 mind which was to make a decision that 10:29 was in the best interests of our 10:30 students and to try to build the 10:33 cadillac model for them understanding 10:35 that we might only be able to deliver a 10:37 chevy 10:38 but that's okay because we idealized the 10:40 best we could do and then work within 10:42 the resources we had 10:43 and for that i thank 10:45 everybody in this town for the past 12 10:48 and a half years that i've been on board 10:50 thank you 11:03 i'd like to thank karen and david for 11:05

their service and david particularly for 11:07 your longevity that's so valuable to the 11:10 community to have someone who served on 11:12 the board as diligently as you have for 11:14 all these years so thank you very much 11:16 and karen thank you for your leadership 11:18 i just want to thank the board 11:20 for appointing me giving me the honor 11:23 and privilege and appointing me to the 11.24 board twice 11:27 it's it's really been a pleasure to work 11:29 over these last two years with you 11:32 and i just i 11:34 am so proud to be able to 11:36 serve 11:37 um in this capacity we were talking on 11:40 the way over from the executive session 11:42 it's such a healthy thing to see so many 11:45 members of the community both applying 11:47 for appointments and running for 11:49 election it's a really healthy aspect of 11:52 having so many people involved in what's 11:53 happening in the school district so i 11:55 thank the community for everything that 11:56 you're doing to support the work of the 11:58 board and the work of the district in 12:00 general thanks 12:16 thank you madam president and i will 12:18 keep my comments very brief as there 12:20 will be a lot of them coming tonight i 12:22 just want to say how thrilled i am to be 12.24 the superintendent of the moore's town 12:26 township public schools i travel about 12:28 an hour each day and uh it is not hard 12:30 to do this town there's no town like 12:33 morristown this town is a lot like the 12:34 town that i chose to live in and i see 12:36 some of the same values here

12:38 um during my transition i really want to 12:41 thank ms shaw who was integral in 12:43 communicating with me on a daily basis 12:45 needs of the community as well as the 12:47 needs of the board i want to thank the 12:49 legend that you had sitting in the 12:50 office dr fitz is a true legend in the 12:52 state of new jersey and he uh did right 12:55 by you a lot of times interims just sit 12:58 in a chair he did the work 12:59 on behalf of your students 13:02 i want to thank my entire administrative 13:03 team my cabinet as well as all 13:05 administrators who over the past two 13:07 weeks i had half hour one-on-ones with 13:09 getting to know them and my next level 13:11 of work here is getting to know you the 13:13 community uh the faculty and staff as 13:16 well as the students 13:18 in my first two days here i've had the 13:19 opportunity to visit four of the schools 13:22 and i really like what i see so far 13:24 one of the things that i liked the most 13:26 when i was in the schools and there's no 13:28 ego in the job when you're a 13:29 superintendent i love the fact that i 13:31 was walking in the halls 13:33 and people said 13:34 excuse me who are you 13:37 it makes me feel good that people are 13:39 out there looking for the safety and 13:40 security now everybody has a nice little 13:42 lap once i say hi i'm the new 13:43 superintendent but it lets me know what 13:45 your values are here michelle spoke to 13:47 the physical safety and psychological 13:49 safety of your students it is clear that 13:51

evening um our presentation tonight is 17:56 to share with you where we are 17:59 as a district in terms of our students 18:01 learning 18:02 thus far into the 18:03 2021-2022 school year we've all lived 18:06 through the learning disruptions of the 18:08 past almost two years 18:10 and so i think it's an important 18:12 as well as appropriate time to look at 18:14 where our students are and highlight 18:15 their progress as well as the learning 18:17 supports um that we are providing as we 18:19 continue with our transition back into 18:22 uh full-day in-person learning 18:25 uh before we begin the curriculum 18:27 committee did ask um as part of my first 18:30 presentation that i spent a little quick 18:32 moment to share a little bit about 18:33 myself as the new director of curriculum 18:35 instruction 18:36 um i began in the district back in july 18:39 um and had the opportunity to work with 18:41 many of the staff and administration 18:43 during the summer programs at ues 18:46 which also gave me the opportunity 18:48 to meet and greet many of the elementary 18:50 and middle school students that 18:51 participated in that program as well as 18:53 some of our high school students who 18:55 volunteered 18:56 this is overall my 17th year in 18:58 education i began as a high school 19:00 science teacher 19:02 for all nine years and then transitioned 19:04 into administration 19:06 as a math and science supervisor high 19:08 school assistant principal and director

19:10 of counseling and assessment before 19:12 coming here to morristown as the 19:13 director of curriculum instruction 19:16 my 19:17 passion has always been about how to 19:19 facilitate and support 19:22 high quality and engaging instruction 19:24 for all of our students 19:26 and the pandemic has presented us all 19:27 both as parents and educators with a 19:29 unique challenge to provide this 19:31 instruction and and see 19:33 the growth and development of our 19:35 students so in my short time here 19:37 working with our administration our our 19:40 teachers 19:41 um and visiting classroom and buildings 19:42 i believe we've responded well to this 19:44 challenge and we'll continue to monitor 19:47 and respond as needed to meet the needs 19:48 of our students 19:53 within the curriculum and instruction 19:55 team i work closely with our content 19:57 supervisors to facilitate the delivery 19:59 of curriculum and i encourage you to 20:00 reach out to them with any of your 20:02 questions um regarding our curriculum in 20:04 addition to their teachers and 20:06 principals 20:09 this year we were excited to return to 20:11 full day in-person learning after a year 20:13 of hybrid learning staff began the year 20:15 working with students to establish 20:17 community and learning expectations for 20:19 the classroom and this included our 20:21 youngest students and those students 20:22 making big transitions such as those 20:24

moving into a new school or those who 20:26 were fully remote last year 20:31 because state testing was cancelled for 20.33 the last two spring administrations all 20:35 districts were required to administer a 20:37 one-time start strong assessment this 20:39 fall to satisfy our federal requirement 20:42 to administer these tests in ela math 20:44 science for this year 20.46these tests were not meant to replace 20:48 the summative new jersey student 20:49 learning assessments um as well as the 20:52 district level assessments that we 20:53 typically use to understand the learning 20:55 progress of our students 20:57 over the course of the year 21:00 this spring we do anticipate 21:02 that we will return uh to an 21.04 administration of the njsla in grades 21:06 three through nine as well as a new 21:09 graduation requirement for our 11th 21:11 graders the new jersey graduation 21:12 proficiency exam um and a letter was 21:15 sent home out to the high school 21:16 students regarding that new assessment 21:18 um we'll continue to communicate any 21:20 additional information that we see 21:23 in addition to that 21:26 um there are still going to be three 21:28 pathways to graduation for our students 21:31 for the class of 2022 uh they will 21:34 continue to be able to use the new 21:36 jersey student learning um uh assessment 21:39 as well as in the second pathway any of 21:41 the alternative assessments that you see 21:44 here 21:45 and a third pathway that is a portfolio 21:47 appeal for the class of 2023 through

21:50 2025 which is our current freshman 21:52 through 11th graders the first pathway 21:54 will now be a passing score on the new 21:56 new jersey gpa assessment to be taken in 21:59 11th grade and this test will assess 22:01 content from algebra 1 geometry and 22:04 english 10 course coursework 22:12 that said as one point of recognition 22:14 for our 22:15 recently graduated class of 2021 we're 22:18 proud to report that 100 of students met 22:20 their assessment requirement to graduate 22:23 despite having a reduced number of 22:24 opportunities to take the psat s.a.t and 22:28 jsla or other 22:30 tests over the last two school years 22:34 as stated earlier the district relies on 22:36 district level assessments to measure 22:38 ongoing growth and to identify student 22:40 learning needs that then guide our 22:42 instruction 22:44 one of the most one of these measures is 22:46 are the 22:46 wnwea map assessments these are short 22:49 online tests that most students in 22:51 grades grade one through eight take in 22:53 the fall and spring to measure their 22:55 learning growth in math and reading 22:57 these tests are adaptive meaning 22:59 questions begin at grade level content 23:01 appropriate for that time of the year 23:03 fall winter or spring and adjust up or 23:06 down depending on each student's 23:07 response 23:11 in the next two slides we'll look at 23:12 students performance on the fall 20 this 23:15 falls map assessments in grades one 23:17

through seven 23:18 one of the things that we've been doing 23:20 is monitoring learning progress with 23:21 ongoing map testing since the start of 23:24 the pandemic 23:25 that occurs and this is occurring as 23:27 part of the formative assessments that 23:28 our teachers are using to deliver uh 23:30 instruction in the classroom with an eye 23.32 for any impacts that were caused by the 23:34 disruption of learning over the last two 23:36 years two years 23:38 to that end we have map tested in the 23:40 spring in the fall and also in the 23:42 winter for some students in order to 23:43 establish a baseline and then 23:45 continuously measure growth to adjust 23:47 our instruction 23:48 and you can see that was our ela data 23:51 this is our 23:53 math data 23:55 for instance we've seen some growth in a 23:57 couple of great levels from fall 2020 to 23:59 fall 2021 in both math and ela 24:02 and we've seen deviations of 24:04 approximately one to five percent in the 24:05 learning progress of students fall to 24:07 fall in the remaining grade levels 24:09 overall at this time as you can see on 24:11 these two slides eighty percent or more 24:13 of our students are at above grade level 24.15 expectations for this time of the year 24:17 across all great levels in ela and 70 78 24:22 or higher for math 24:28 as we moved into this year we did try to 24:30 identify areas of strength within the 24:32 new jersey student learning standards 24:34 strands that students demonstrated from

24:36 the map testing in math and ela as the 24:38 starting points for instructional focus 24:40 for this school year 24:42 and as you can see 24:44 in ela i said 80 of our students are at 24:47 or above grade level and within that 60 24:49 of students are within the high to high 24:52 average we did see strengths across in k 24:54 through 3 and 4 through 7 with 24:56 vocabulary use and acquisition 25:00 our areas of strength and math 25:02 again accept approximately 80 of 25:04 students in each grade and of that 60 25:07 percent also we're at the high and . 25:09 average 25:10 and within our 25:13 anchor standards students demonstrated 25:15 strengths across all six of the standard 25:17 strands and performance as they were 25:20 aligned to the different grade levels 25:24 the next two slides show a 25:26 disaggregation of our map data on grade 25:28 level or above performance for different 25:30 subgroups within the district 25:32 this slide does demonstrate a trend seen 25:34 nationally where vulnerable 25:36 subpopulations of students such as our 25:37 special education and esl students as 25:40 well as those from lower socioeconomic 25:42 backgrounds have experienced the 25:43 greatest impacts from the pandemic uh 25:46 over the last two school years 25:54 and then oh sorry moving forward however 25:57 what we want to try to do is to 26:00 adjust our instruction to make sure that 26:02 we are providing support for students 26:04 who are not meeting grade level 26:05

expectations 26:07 for students that are not meeting these 26:08 expectations we continue to build 26:10 consistent basic skills and reading 26:12 support programming 26:14 in ela we've used the learning loss 26:16 grant funds to provide our teachers with 26:18 additional training as well as to 26:20 acquire additional resources to support 26:22 our ela programming students who dot did 26:25 not meet grade level expectations in the 26:27 spring were invited in both math and ela 26:30 to attend a six-week summer engagement 26:32 program where 23 teachers provided small 26:35 group instruction in math and reading 26:38 these students were also identified for 26:39 continued support as we entered into 26:41 this year through our reading and math 26:43 support program where we're focusing on 26:45 fluency and number sense in math and 26:47 found and foundational skills and 26:49 comprehension in ela 26:57 moving forward to address the needs of 26:59 students 27.00 we are 27:02 [Music] 27:04 going to be looking uh to focus in ela 27:06 in k-5 27:08 we're currently in the adoption phase 27:10 for a new ela curriculum for next year 27:12 that will increase rigor with new 27.14 programming resources as well as 27:16 building an embedded professional 27:18 development for our teachers to support 27:20 this instruction in grades six through 27:22 eight the focus is on developing methods 27:24 such as notice and note signposts that 27:26 support student ability to conduct

27:28 literary analysis across a wide range of 27:30 types of genre of literature 27:32 and informational text which is an 27:34 important college and career readiness 27:36 skill as they enter into the high school 27:38 grades 27:41 in math we continue to place a strong 27:43 emphasis on engaging students in . 27:44 mathematical practices including 27:46 reasoning and modeling with more and 27:48 more complex content as they progress 27:50 k-12 within our math curriculum 27:55 [Music] 27:58 while assessment data to measure 27:59 learning growth over the course of year 28:00 is an important way to identify needs 28:03 and adjust instruction we're also 28:04 looking uh this year and many other 28:07 measures used to determine each child's 28:09 need in a holistic way that considers 28:11 the whole child and some of the things 28:12 that we're looking at you know we're 28:14 monitoring uh marking period grades 28:17 classroom engagement information 28:18 assessments um that teachers are giving 28:20 on a daily basis attendance counselor 28:23 and case management referrals as well as 28:25 parent and teacher communication . 28:31 in science uh we did not uh we were not 28:35 uh able to give the state assessments in 28:37 science however we have adjusted our 28:39 curriculum to meet the new next-gen uh 28:42 science standards in all grades and we 28:44 do anticipate that this spring along 28:46 with math and ela we will be testing in 28:48 grades 5 8 and 11 in science 28:52 um 28:54

and the district has adapted all of our 28:56 assessments in those grades 28:58 in all grades excuse me um in order to 29:02 prepare students for those 29:05 for those tests uh in grades one through 29:07 five we continue to develop hands-on 29:08 learning opportunities for science 29:10 lessons and creating meaningful 29:12 connections between our science 29.14 ela math and i apologize but social 29:16 studies should also be on there in 29:18 grades 6 through 12 we have a continued 29:20 focus on finding engaging phenomena that 29:23 leverage students use of science in the 29:24 engineering practices 29:31 as we take a look at some of the 29:32 secondary data and specifically the high 29:34 school i think it's important to note 29.36 that this really begins to reflect a 29:38 culmination of the learning that occurs 29:40 in kindergarten through senior year 29:43 here are some areas of particular pride 29:45 and while not every child can be 29:47 recognized here it demonstrates the 29.49rigor quality of instruction and 29:51 development that all students engage in 29:53 throughout through our various academic 29:55 and extracurricular programs 29:58 this information is from the school year 30:00 2020 2021 which we know uh was a 30:04 challenging year 30:05 but despite that challenge 30:07 our students are still have still 30:10 excelled in a number of areas and i 30:12 think that's something that we should be 30:13 proud of and celebrate 30:16 when we looked at our psat data for our 30:18 juniors and sophomores

30:21 you can see that we are still well above 30:22 the state and national averages 30:28 when we look at our sat data the 2021 30:31 sat performance results show that 30:33 students continue 30:35 to show consistently high performance 30:37 compared to their national peers 30:39 and it is important to know that there 30:41 were less opportunities for students to 30:42 sit for the s.a.t after december of 2019 30:46 and currently the college board has 30:48 resumed its normal administration 30:50 schedule 30:51 starting this year for this year 30:55 some of our students also participate in 30:57 the act 30:59 and again as you can see if we look at 31:00 our 31:01 composite we do the state did not 31:03 compound not state level data but when 31:06 we look at the composite scores again 31:09 our students perform well above 31:11 the national average 31:13 [Music] 31:16 our latest ap scores from last year do 31:18 show a dip in the percentage of students 31:20 scoring a three or higher however it's 31:23 important to note that the college board 31:25 provided an all digital exam format 31:28 instead of a paper and pencil based and 31:30 reduced the amount of content that was 31:32 assessed due to the school closures in 31:34 the 31:35 2019-2020 year last year they did return 31:38 to a full exam that covered the entire 31:41 core content of those courses 31:43 and assessed students across all of the 31:45

know there's a reason our kids 44:12 and our data is different but i do want 44:14 to say that i think it was a testimony 44:16 to how hard 44:18 our teachers and parents and 44:19 administration were because there were 44:21 challenges online and we know it okay 44:25 uh you're gonna have to move oh there we 44:27 go sorry about that thank you um 44:30 the the first that really tried to 44:32 combine this really simply you can see 44:34 up top there are eight core areas that 44:35 each school will self-assess the 44:38 self-assessment goes through a 44:40 combination of discussions with 44:42 our sel committees our school climate 44:45 committees and also 44:47 our administration teachers off the top 44:49 you can see how they self-assess for 44:50 programs and approaches 44:52 training staff instruction curriculum 44:54 around hiv hiv personnel 44:57 school reporting investigative 44:58 procedures and hiv reporting the most 45:01 that each school can obtain is a score 45:02 of 78 the average um during the 2021 45:05 school year across schools was 71 and 45:08 you could see um each of the schools 45:10 listed and then their total score 45:13 in parentheses there is a score from um 45:15 actually the previous year so we 45.17 certainly want to track um 45:19 you know our data and from a school 45:21 perspective look at when when we look at 45:23 our self-assessment look at the areas of 45:25 strength but also as a district as a 45:28 board and as a school really look at 45:30 those areas that we can improve on

voice and why we need to keep talking 52:10 about this and not just amongst 52:11 ourselves but engaged with students 52:13 engage with teachers engage with 52:15 administrators and members of the 52:17 community 52:18 and so as we met throughout the year 52:21 during these two community engagement 52:22 meetings which was uh ultimately 52.24 actually facilitated by students by by 52:26 the spring we continue to share the 52:28 progress of the discussions that we were . 52:30 having 52:31 at the subcommittee meetings and so 52:34 this list of five topics are what the 52:36 focus was for each of the subcommittees 52:38 so we had one subcommittee focused on 52:41 represent cultural representation in our 52.44 curriculum 52:45 we had one subcommittee that was focused 52:47 on creating safe places for students to 52:49 share their concerns 52:50 a subcommittee focused on hiring and 52:52 retaining diverse faculty and staff 52:55 a subcommittee on improving academic 52:57 achievement trends and then finally a 53:00 subcommittee on the fair treatment of 53:01 all students and what that might look 53:02 like in discipline and hiv uh policies 53:06 going forward and by 53:07 the end of the year 53:09 each of these subcommittees was tasked 53:11 with creating what we were then calling 53:13 an action plan knowing that we were 53:15 going to have a significant turnover in 53:18 upper levels of administration we didn't 53:20 feel that it was um in the best interest 53:23 of the work itself to have a plan
