meeting of the moorestown township board of education is called to order this meeting is called in conformance with the open public meetings act with adequate notice provided as follows that's better 0:10 notice filed with the courier post on july 1st 2021 and notice filed with the burlington county times on july 1st 2021 i'm going to ask if we could have a moment of silence please rise for the pledge of allegiance 0:36 i pledge allegiance to the plagues of america 0:55 hey mr heiser can you please call roll dr alberti mrs arcaro burns present mrs fallows mackaluso 1:06 this is micaopoulos mrs morano 1:13 miss romano here mr villanueva here dr schneider here mr 1:19 weeks president thank you okay we've already conducted the executive session uh portion of our meeting and let's see moving on um i will uh call for a uh kind of a call for approval of the 1:36 minutes i have a motion to approve the minutes for the meetings from march 8th march 22nd and april 5th both the executive and this regular meeting and the special meetings second any comments questions hearing none all in favor 1:55 aye any opposed extensions 2:01 okay got that noted okay moving on are there any are there 2:07 any communications for the board 2:14 okay hearing none we'll move on start with uh president's remarks so good evening uh we anticipated a larger crowd this evening so i'm glad we moved to a larger space uh seems to be a prudent decision on our part uh so we appreciate the engagement and interest of those who are in attendance especially the members of 2:34 the morristown education association to whom i extend a sincere and heartfelt welcome tonight we will be voting on the approval of the 2022-23 budget this budget is the result of many hours of work discussion and efforts by our administration and staff while difficult choices were made about what stayed in and what did not i believe these efforts will pay off in the excellence in educational experience and opportunity we will continue to be able to provide our students while still living within our means in addition to the budget part of the board's work also involves renewing the agreement with our teachers paraprofessionals secretaries custodians and other represented staff as i noted in my remarks in a previous board meeting we are still working through negotiations and i want to share a bit of perspective now this is not the time or place to go into details but what i have said and will say again is that it is not due that the fact that we haven't come to a resolution yet it's not due to the lack of respect for what those members of our district do and what they've provided for our students and school community is not due to a lack of understanding of what we have all been through over the last two years with the pandemic and adapting to different ways to help our children succeed and thrive it is also not due to a lack of understanding about the challenges we all face with the economic conditions that exist finally it is also not about a lack of desire to take care of those who take care of our children and form the backbone of our educational community 4:06 reasonable people can differ on the way to get to an outcome and have mutual respect while they work through those differences that is what we all strive to teach our children as they grow and learn to compromise and negotiate their way 4:19 towards understanding and solutions i know we are all well-intentioned passionate people who care deeply about 4.25 finding a way forward we are all committed to a resolution and are still working to find that pathway it may take more efforts and some 4:37 this isn't an oscar speech i'm being played off it sounds like so as i was saying it may take more efforts and some additional guidance to do that and if we're resolute 4:52 open trusting and understanding i believe and know we will find that solution and can maintain mutual respect while doing so interestingly our differences in getting to a mutually agreeable solution are not 5:05 the only thing we have in common we share a focus on the goal of finding a path forward that addresses those differences fairly and provides a way to come to an agreement an agreement that allows us to get back to the goal of 5:16 continuing to provide an exceptional educational experience for each child in an operationally and fiscally 5:22 sustainable way that is our charge that is our commitment 5:28 and that is what i believe we will find a way to do and once we do it is my sincere hope that we can appreciate the process it took to get there that we can understand that the process though challenging at times was what 5:40 helped lead us there and hopefully learn from it and work together to secure the foundation for the next time we are in this process we all owe it to those who come after us and sit in these seats and do this work 5:51 that we are all fortunate and honored to do i also want to briefly touch on our 5:57 evolving communication strategy some have asked for changes to the format in this of this business meeting for the board of education that we hold in public on a regular basis those changes have specifically included a request to change the public comment portion of the meeting turning it into a question and answer session as a board and in our various committees we have discussed this request and 6:21 determined that we will fundamentally maintain the meeting structure as it is at the same time being responsive to that request we have created and will continue to highlight those ways for the public to ask questions and receive 6:33 answers in what we believe are the most effective ways possible to recap quickly please bring concerns to the attention of teachers and building administration beyond that there are subject area 6:45 supervisors district administration and other personnel the answers that are generally sought are often available directly from those people however if those avenues are not effective then please by all 6:57 means bring your concerns to the attention of the superintendent and the board leadership in addition to being available by email for the board and phone and email for the superintendent we have created an online form for

the communications committee will continue to hold community engagement forums we have engaged with a communications 7:19 specialist who administered a community communications survey and will follow up soon with in-person focus groups to help 7:25

for example if a girl wants to be a construction worker a job that is stereotypically a male job she can

similarly if a boy someday wants to be a nurse he can the message here will be that both boys

and focused on developmentally appropriate instruction to date i have not received one complaint about an

inappropriate health lesson being taught to students so if you have further questions pertaining to your child and the

if you don't get a satisfactory answer ask your principal however it is my hope that my statement 14.21

is available on our website to help you with the next steps and to coordinate with your building principle for more specificity

that being said i've already spoken to the curriculum committee of the board about making our curriculum guides which are all posted online

what is being taught in a particular curriculum this would include big ideas objectives and assessment methods but to

be clear it will not detail individual teachers lesson plans the curriculum committee will be

reviewing such a sample at our may meeting and if all goes well we'll implement that strategy moving forward

an immediate goal for me in that area would be to update all of our health curriculum in this way with some more specifics and have that posted and

available online before the start of next school year so that everybody can see what's being taught

on a completely different note but also a very important matter every three years you may or may not be aware

15:32

that all schools in the state of new jersey must test for lead in water in november such testing took place in

15:39

our schools the results of a first draw of water show that seven faucets district wide

15:44

were found to have led over the acceptable limits all seven faucets were in the kitchens of south valley roberts and morristown 15:51

high school a second draw on all faucets was conducted which concluded they were within the appropriate limits

in it but in addition to that as a precautionary measure the district started remediations in december to be

16:03

clear none of these faucets were used for cooking or drinking in any way

16:08

the precautionary measures taken included replacing all supply lines fittings valves and outlets as well as 16:15

installing lead filters it was determined that there are no more unacceptable levels of lead in our water

16:21

and we just received the final report on this matter as of yesterday afternoon so this is why you're hearing of this today

16:27

because within 72 hours of receiving that official report we are required to post those documents on our website and 16:34

inform the community there for your review if you should wish to do so the next testing year for lead will be

16:40

in the 24-25 school year finally at may's board of education

16:46

meeting i'll be sharing our efforts starting this summer and heading into next school school year that are funded

by the remaining federal funds through our esser grants categories of spending will be disaggregated in specific instructional

16:59 and facilities areas additionally it'll be clear which grant funds are paying for which efforts and the amounts

involved once i present it in may it'll be then posted online for all community members to view at any time

30:36 [Music] our first order of business was a presentation by michael rouse who's the 30:42 executive director of the esf camps esf is the summer camp that's run on the campus of the middle school that we've had a relationship for a number of years with uh that has provided a nice 30:54 a nice opportunity for students in town and outside of town to participate in a 31:00 great camp but also give us a nice revenue stream obviously cove had an impact on camp 31:07 enrollment the last couple of years and we renegotiated some of the terms of our existing agreement 31:14 [Music] which will expire after this summer and i think there's a mutual interest in 31:23 extending that agreement presumably on terms closer to as they were originally intended pre-pandemic 31:31 so hopefully we'll have some updates on that in months to come we also discussed our custodial bid which went out several 31:43 weeks ago i believe it's now closed mr heiser and we have received a number of 31:49 bids for custodial services that we're reviewing uh we have not yet analyzed those bids but 31:56 i expect we'll do so in the next month or so and hopefully i have some recommendations for the 32:01 board mr volpe already addressed the lead 32:06 testing issue which was the subject of our discussion at finance and operations this month i won't repeat what mr volpe has already stated we talked about a number of transportation issues in my mind 32:20 probably the most significant is that non-renewals are prevalent in the state and in the county and we're no exception uh 32:32 we believe that 11 of our 13 13 routes have been non-renewed 32:37 and this presents us with a significant problem budgetarily and operationally we are 32:44 going to have to get creative and get some 32:50 new companies in or hopefully get favorable terms from our existing bus companies to uh to make sure that we've got efficient transportation lined up for next year um we're considering the possibility of 33:04 a joint bid with other districts but um for a number of reasons we're not sure that's going to work um but we expect to get bid specifications out uh if not this week next week um and so 33:18 more on that to come we talked about the milk issue that struck parts of new jersey uh 33:26 several weeks ago probably about a month ago now where there was some contaminated milk that 33:32 hit some schools i think most notably camden there were some kids that got sick from drinking 33:37 milk that was contaminated with sanitizer um 33:43 we we became aware that one of our schools and forgiving i forget which one 33:48 the ues had uh had milk that was uh not contaminated 33:55 but was on the same lot um the 34:02 suspected content it was a suspected contamination and so 34:07 the department of health came out we had to sort of quarantine i hate to use that word but quarantine 34:12 the milk and have it destroyed in front of the department of health but thankfully 34:18 we don't believe it was actually contaminated and there were no issues in terms of kids ingesting any 34:25 contaminated milk mr heiser gave us an update on the

attention and engaged that is all dependent on if wi-fi crop cooperates at school and in their houses 1:10:41 and then my lesson can begin it hasn't always been easy but i've gotten used to it when we were first asked to teach from 1:10:48 home i started out in my dining room it was an absolute mess with books papers and lists all over the place 1:10:55 i spent so much time at that table that there are dent marks still on my carpet 1:11:00 my my wife actually made me put that in there uh if i had an assignment due at a certain 1:11:06 time i would sit there grading and returning them if students didn't turn them in i would constantly message them and sometimes 1:11:13 email their parents asking for their help most nights i didn't turn my computer off until eight or nine 1:11:19 my back started hurting from all the hours i sat at that chair and it still hurts when i learned how to teach my class 1:11:25 using google me i was so excited that i could see the faces of my students again i got kicked out of the dining room i 1.11.31 had to go to the room in the farthest corner of my house so my wife could teach her students and my two high school kids could attend their remote classes i had to practice controlling the volume of my voice which is not easy to do 1.11.44 that might have been the hardest thing for me to do during this pandemic my family was very excited when i was allowed to go back into school to teach 1:11:52 i was just one of three teachers who did that and i loved the peace and quiet and also i didn't have to control how loud i was throughout these two plus years i tried to give my students the same memorable experiences that my former classes had 1.12.05 i spent hours modifying my project so my students could experience similar things as kids i taught in the past 1:12:11 i learned google classrooms so i could check their work in real time and give immediate feedback i drove house to 1:12:17 house to drop off books to the students in my class partly so they could have what they needed but mostly so they could see me and i could see them and at least have a little bit of normalcy what i'm most proud of from that year is 1:12:28 my big newscast that i do at the end of every school year after reading charlie in the chocolate factory instead of 1:12:34 filming live in school like i always do i did dozens of different google meets with the help of the awesome media 1:12:40 specialist at the ues carol herb 1:12:46 we put it together so my students that year could have something they would remember for the rest of their lives i'm 1:12:51 not the only one who did these kinds of things every person in this room did so many selfless acts to make the 1:12:57 experiences of their students memorable in the end those are the things these kids will remember i saw two former students this year the first is quentin law who was now a member of the town council i asked him what he remembered 1:13:08 from my class and he said the state report project that we did that is based on the ncaa basketball tournament i give the kids teams to follow and they have to do a report on one of the states where the team is located sorry to start 1:13:19 intro just i have to ask you to please one more okay okay almost done sorry i i talk a lot sorry katie yeah 1:13:26 chief all right my wife is the second great teacher robert stewart quinn said he remembers the projects and still roots for the teams he had the 1:13:33 other former students my current teaching partner lex massa who's doing a phenomenal job by the way she told me 1:13:38 she remembers going to one of her softball games and she does that now because i did that for her i still love 1:13:44 going to see my students play i'll skip the last paragraph we aren't asking to break the bank we're asking for a fair 1:13:50 contract for from the morristown boe that shows that the staff members in morristown are valued for the work that 1:13:55 we do every day to help make our students the great people they are they are and eventually turn out to be
